Passport and Tourist Visa Conditions

Australian ordinary passport holders require a visa to enter Laos as a This advice is current for Mon, 5th November 2018. tourist. To obtain a visa before departing Australia, travellers should send their application (including those documents listed in the application form on this site) to the Laotian Embassy in Canberra at least 5 working days prior to their departure. Usually only single entry tourist visas are given, which cost \$45 (\$60 for urgent issue) and allow entry into Laos for a period of up 30 days. Australians may also obtain a visa on arrival at many boarder crossings upon presenting two passport sized photographs, a copy of their itinerary and payment of a fee. Travellers intending to obtain a visa on arrival are recommended to contact the Laotian Embassy to ensure their itinerary complies with visa on arrival issue points.

When entering Laos, travellers should be able to provide evidence of their ability to financially maintain themselves during their visit, confirmed onward/return tickets and their itinerary. Passports should have at least two blank pages and be valid for at least six months beyond the expected stay in Laos. Travellers should check their passports when entering and leaving Laos to ensure they have received an entry/exit stamp. Current DFAT Travel Advice

Exercise normal safety precautions in Laos. Use common sense. Look out for suspicious behaviour. Reconsider your need to travel in Xaisomboun province, east of Vang Vieng, because of potential for armed attacks. There have been several shootings and detonations of improvised explosive devices, resulting in deaths and injuries.

Australians have died or been injured in accidents along the river at Vang Vieng. Check your travel insurance will cover you and assess risks before taking part in water activities. See Local travel. Tropical storms, typhoons, flooding and landslides are likely during the wet season, which usually falls May to November. See <u>Natural disasters</u>. Penalties for drug offences are severe and include the death penalty. More information: Laws. Visa exemptions for travelling to Thailand through a land border crossing are restricted to two entries per calendar year. See Entry and exit.

Vaccination against Hepatitis A is recommended for travellers to Laos. Vaccination against Hepatitis B, Rabies (particularly if working with animals) and Typhoid (particularly when travelling to areas with poor sanitation and hygiene) should be considered, especially by frequent or long stay travellers. Cholera is reported in Laos but vaccination is generally not recommended, care with food and beverage selection is far more important. There is a medium risk of Malaria in Laos and Dengue Fever also occurs, thus insect avoidance measures and anti malarial medication may be necessary depending on itinerary. Japanese Encephalitis is present in Laos, vaccination should be considered by travellers spending more than four weeks in rural areas of the transmission zones.

Regardless of destination, all travellers should be up-to-date with their routine "background" vaccinations, including a recent annual Influenza vaccination. Please consult a medical practitioner or contact The Travel Doctor for your specific risk to these preventable diseases and the appropriate avoidance measures. Australians travelling to Laos should ensure that they have adequate travel insurance to cover the length of their stay. Medications that are legal in Australia may be illegal in other countries. Time Differences between Laos and Australia

Laos is Greenwich Mean Time + 7 hours. Daylight saving is not observed. The applicable time zone is called Indochina Time (ICT).

Laos, 12 noon, Winter (Dec) = Perth 1pm; Darwin 2:30pm; Brisbane 3pm; Adelaide 3:30pm; Hobart, Melbourne, Sydney 4pm.

Laos, 12 noon, Summer (Jun) = Perth 1pm; Darwin, Adelaide 2:30pm; Brisbane, Hobart, Melbourne, Sydney, 3pm.

Duty Free Allowances for Laos and Australia

Duty Free allowance when entering Laos:

Alcohol: 1 litre of sprits and 2 litres of wine.

Tobacco: 200 cigarettes or 50 cigars or 250g of tobacco. Perfume: 250ml of eau de toilette and 50g of perfume.

Other Goods: Up to US\$50.

Duty Free allowance when entering Australia:

Alcohol: 2.25 litres.

Tobacco: 25 cigarettes plus one open packet of cigarettes. Other Tax Free Goods: Up to AUD\$900 (\$450 for minors).

Minors may not claim alcohol or tobacco products. Further restrictions apply to these and other goods, travellers should familiarise themselves with these restrictions before entry.





Banknotes of Laos

The legal currency of Laos is the Kip, which is abbreviated using the symbol $\mbox{\ensuremath{\mbox{\ensuremath{\mbox{\sc Kip}}}}} and has the currency code "LAK". The subunit of the kip is called the att, however this unit is obsolete. The following units of currency are the most common in Laos however other versions and denominations are also in circulation. Coins are no longer used due to their small value. Pictures are not to scale. As it is illegal in many countries to print copies of bank notes, travellers are advised to remove the below images prior to travelling.$

About Laos

Full Name: Sathalanalat Paxathipatai Paxaxon Lao (Lao People's Democratic Republic).

Independence: July 1949 (from France).

Size: 236,800 sq km (similar to Victoria).

Population: 7 million. Vientiane 810,000.

Ethnicity: Lao 55%, Khmou 11%, Hmong 8%, other ethnic groups 26%.

Language: Lao is the official language. English is commonly used in major tourist centres. French & Chinese are also spoken alongside various other ethnic languages.

Religion: Buddhist 90%, Christian 1.5%.

GDP Per Capita: US\$3,000 (Australia US\$40,800).

Significant Dates:

1353 - Lane Xang (million elephant) Kingdom formed.

1548-71 - Rule of King Setthathirath. Capital moved from Luang Prabang to Vientiane.

- Dutch merchants visit Laos. 1641

1695 - King Suriya Vongsa dies, Laos eventually splits into 3 kingdoms which are dominated by Siamese (Thai) overlords.

- Siam cedes territory east of the Mekong to French Indochina.

1944-45 - Japan briefly occupies Laos.

- Laos gains independence as a 1954 monarchy. Civil war between royalists and communists begins.

1960's - US bombs North Vietnamese sanctuaries in Laos.

1975 - Communists seize power ending the 600 year old monarchy. The King later dies in captivity.

1986 - Laos introduces some market oriented reforms.
